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Family Engagement: Defined

- An umbrella term describing the social dynamics and interaction patterns between families and educators
- Reflects the joint influences and the collaborative efforts of parents and educators working in alignment to support child success
- Family-centered and grounded in cultural values, beliefs and practices



Family Engagement as a Multidimensional Construct

- Engagement as a practice
 - Actions and co-actions that support learning and development (what parents do)
 - Structural features including behaviors and contexts
- Engagement as a relationship
 - Relational and affective features influencing learning opportunities and outcomes
 - Quality of interpersonal dynamics between parents and children, and parents and teachers (i.e., how they interact)



The Evidence for Family Engagement

- Correlational and experimental research speaks to the importance of alignment and collaboration between families and educators
- Relevance in ECE and as children (and families) transition to school is well documented
- Despite all we know, family engagement practices and policies are largely regimented by minimal standards to "involve" parents, not partnerships
